The Do's and Don'ts of Personal Statements

<u>Do</u>:

- * Concentrate on one theme.
- * Be unique.
- * Start by grabbing attention.
- * Read and follow directions; answer all questions.
- * Consult outside sources.
- * Explain inconsistencies in your history.
- * Show. (Don't just tell.)
- * Focus should be relevant to your field of study.
- * Show your personality.
- * Be straightforward and confident; show your strengths.
- * Back things up; be specific.
- * Have someone else look it over.
- * Give yourself at least one week to work on your statement.

<u>Don't:</u>

- * Have grammatical errors.
- * Appear too scattered.
- * Start with "I was Born."
- * Make it a sob story.
- * Make it a resume.
- * Repeat things already mentioned in your application.
- * Use the same statement for every school.
- * Tell.
- * Be general.
- * Use clichés, lists, or chronological histories.
- * Use humor unless confident of response.
- * Focus too much on other people unless they were a big influence on your career path.
- * Forget to proofread
